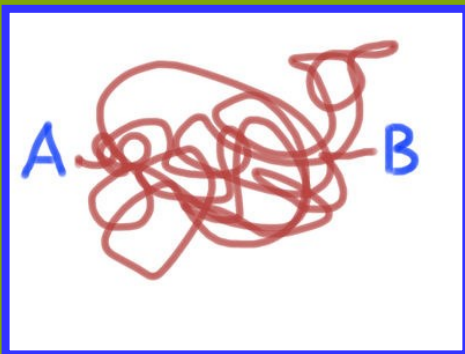
Traffic signals help ensure the safe and orderly flow of traffic, and protect pedestrians and vehicles at busy intersections. Look for new signals coming soon to:
